## ***Sociology in the Academy: Its Current and Prospective Position***

DEAR COLLEAGUES:

It is time to make your plans to attend our 78th annual meeting. The conference will provide over 251 sessions – including roundtables – on a diversity of topics. In terms of the number of sessions and the number of participants listed in the program (1,075), the Oakland meeting will be the largest in the history of the association.

Keeping with this year's theme, *Sociology in the Academy: Its Current and Prospective Position*, there will be many panels and presentations given by faculty and by sociologists who have become provosts, deans, and even presidents of colleges and universities. These sessions cover a wide range of topics, among them a view of the hierarchy that exists in academic sociology, graduate employee organizing in academe, revising the undergraduate sociology program, linking the campus to the community, what makes a good sociology department, and an analysis of the status of sociology in the academy.

In addition there are seven author meets critics sessions, including recent work by Jeffrey Alexander, Kathy Charmaz, Dennis Loo and Peter Phillips, Ivan Light and others. There are also workshops dealing with visual sociology, teaching, parenting for sociologists, social justice, social integration, and choosing and planning for graduate school among others.

So make plans now to attend, renew old connections, make new ones, and enjoy the many delights of Oakland, Berkeley and San Francisco. Oakland's Chinatown is two blocks away. Old Oakland is next door. Jack London square is nearby, and BART is steps away from the front door of the convention hotel – it will have you in Berkeley in three stops and San Francisco is just two.

Please join us for the 2007 Pacific Sociological Association's annual meeting. We don't want to miss seeing you there!

Several points regarding meeting pre-registration, program participation, and membership are discussed below. These items require your attention.

### *Pre-registration and Membership Dues*

**WHO HAS TO PAY REGISTRATION FEES?** If you are listed on the program and will be attending the conference, you must pre-register for the annual meeting before March 5 in order for your name to be listed in the final program. A membership and registration form is included in this newsletter. One is also available on the PSA web site ([pacificsoc.org](http://pacificsoc.org)). If you have not already paid pre-registration fees, please return the form with your payment. If you were a member in 2006, you should already have received a renewal for 2007 dues and a pre-registration form for the annual meeting.

**WHO DOESN'T HAVE TO PAY REGISTRATION FEES?** If you are listed on the program but will NOT be attending the annual meeting, you do not have to pay pre-registration fees. If you are not attending, you do not have to pay registration fees.

**WHO ELSE HAS TO PAY MEMBERSHIP DUES?** If you are listed on the program and you will be attending the meeting and you are a sociologist (e.g., undergraduate and graduate student majors, faculty members or applied sociologist) and you also reside in the Pacific region (AZ, CA, NM, UT, NV, CO, HI, MT, OR, AK, ID, Alberta, British Columbia, Baja CA, Sonora, or Chihuahua), you must pay not only pre-registration fees, but also 2007 membership dues.

**WHO DOESN'T HAVE TO PAY MEMBERSHIP DUES?** If you are listed on the program but will not be attending the conference, you do not need to pay membership dues. If you are listed on the

program and are also attending the conference, you do not need to pay membership dues if you a) are NOT a sociologist (meaning you are not a faculty member in sociology or an applied sociologists or an undergraduate or graduate student majoring in sociology) and/or b) you do NOT reside in the Pacific region.

However, *everyone* listed on the program is encouraged to become a member.

#### Program Participation

Being on the program means being listed in any position – presider, moderator, panelist, critic, roundtable presenter, roundtable

presider/discussant, seminar leader/presenter, discussant, session organizer, presenter, workshop leader, speaker, etc. In short, any place your name appears is counted as participation.

#### Attendance at the Meeting

If you are attending the meeting but are not on the program, you are expected to pay either pre-registration fees or registration fees at the door. Pre-registration fees are US\$40 / CDN\$45 for faculty and/or over \$15,000 income per year and US\$20 / CDN\$23 for students and/or under \$15,000 income per year. Registration fees at the door will be US\$50 / CDN\$55 for faculty and/or over \$15,000 income per year and US\$25

## Volunteer To Serve On A Committee

Committees are vital to the proper functioning of the Association. Each year there are vacancies on the various committees that must be filled. Each year the Committee on Committees is looking for interested and committed members who can be recommended to the President and the Council for possible appointment.

Committee Membership must represent the Southern, Central, and Northern sections of the PSA's western region. Usually there is one opening for each region on each appointed committee. **TOUR 1** – date & time TBA: *New Era/New Politics*. Stroll through downtown Oakland and discover the places where Oakland African American leaders have made their mark. Learn how Lionel Wilson, Delilah Beasley, Robert Maynard, the Dellums family, Josephine Baker, and others changed the Bay Area and California. Includes a stop at the African American Museum and Library. This walking tour will leave from the hotel registration desk.

**TOUR 2** – Friday March 30, 2 – 3:30 PM: *Oakland's Chinatown* with William Wong, journalist, social historian and author of *Images of America: Oakland's Chinatown*. Learn about the history of the Chinese in the Bay Area, stroll by sidewalk markets filled with fresh fish, fruits, and vegetables, visit cultural sites, and stop at the Asian Resource Center. Have lunch in Chinatown (cost not included). This walking tour will leave from the hotel registration desk at 2 pm.

**TOUR 3** – Friday March 30, 10 am – 1 pm: *The Delancey Street Project in San Francisco*. For 30 years, Delancey Street has had a mission of taking in representatives of our society's most serious social problems, and, by a process of each one helping another, has been solving the problems of generations of poverty, illiteracy, lack of job

skills, substance abuse, homelessness, recidivism, gangs, teen pregnancies, and victims of abuse. Residents gain an academic education, marketable skills, dignity and integrity. Lunch will follow tour at the Delancey Cafeteria (cost of lunch not included). Located in downtown San Francisco near the Embarcadero. Transportation is by BART and N-Judah Street Car (not included in the cost of the tour). This tour will leave from the hotel registration desk at 10 am.

**TOUR 4** – Friday March 30, 10 am – 1 pm: *The Edible Schoolyard at Martin Luther King JR Middle School in Berkeley*. This tour provides a look at an urban public school with a one-acre organic garden and kitchen classroom. Using food systems as a unifying concept, students learn how to grow, harvest, and prepare nutritious seasonal produce. This experience fosters a better understanding of how the natural world sustains us. The goal is to foster environmental stewardship. Transportation is by BART (not included with cost of tour) and then about an eight block walk. On the way back from the school, you will visit the Monterey Market. This trip will leave from the hotel registration desk at 10 am. The guide will be Kevin Wehr of CSU Sacramento.

**TOUR 5** – Friday March 30, noon – 2 pm: *Cityscapes & Public Spaces*. Discover hidden parks, rooftop gardens, and other delights while experiencing some of the colorful history and distinctive old architecture of San Francisco. Transportation is by BART (not included with the cost of the tour). Participants will take BART to the Montgomery Station and meet the SF City Guide at the Native Sons Monument at the corner of Montgomery and Market.

### Endowment Committee Announces Student Travel Grants for 2007 Meeting

With the approval of Council, the Endowment Committee will once again offer twenty-five \$100 travel grants available to help pay expenses for graduate and undergraduate students who are giving a presentation at next year's annual meeting in Oakland.

The travel grant awards will be open only to undergraduate and graduate students who are not employed full-time in an academic or non-academic institution. Students who are eligible must also be listed as a presenter or co-presenter in a session in this preliminary program. Eligible students must also be members and must have paid pre-registration fees for the conference.

PROCEDURES FOR APPLICATION FOR A TRAVEL GRANT: Students who meet the eligibility requirements above need to email their name to the Co-Chair of the Endowment Committee, Sandra Way,

at New Mexico State University (sway@nmsu.edu). The deadline for submission is February 20, 2007. ## Suggestions for Giving a First-Rate Presentation

[NOTE: this is reprinted from the *Newsletter of the Midwest Sociological Association* and was written by Barbara Keating, Minnesota State – Mankato; it has been slightly edited. We continue to reprint it because it offers excellent advice for everyone on the program.

If you were a discussant, how would you like to get the papers for review the night before the session? As an audience member, how do you like it when presenters read their papers word for word while droning on and on through fifty years of literature review?

I make the following suggestions to new and experienced presenters.

1. Get your completed paper to the discussant at least a month before the meetings. A good review can be tremendously helpful for revising the paper for publication. But it takes time and thought. Every year, however, some discussants do not get papers until they arrive at the meetings. The discussants are doing you a favor. Help them to help you by giving them the time they need.

2. After you have finished your formal written paper, edit it for a presentation version. Remember, you may have only 12-15 minutes

to present if there are four other presenters. Discuss only what is important. For a traditional research paper, for example, focus on the findings. Introduce the topic succinctly, summarize the literature briefly, mention the methods in passing and spend most of your time discussing the findings and their implications.

3. Do not read your paper to the audience. Talk about it. The well-crafted written formal sentence may be a better visual than audio experience. Remember, you audience is listening, not reading.

4. Arrive at the session early enough to set up any AV equipment you are using. This will also allow you to meet the other panelists. The organizer and/or presider will brief you on organization, order and time limits.

5. Adhere to time limits. Four to five paper presentations, discussant comments, and audience participation do not allow much flexibility in one session. Presiders may enforce appropriate social sanctions on presenters who monopolize time.

6. If you bring copies of your paper for distribution, you may reduce the weight by printing single space on both sides of each page. Many presenters must bring copies of the statistical tables or model figures, perhaps with an abstract.

# California and the American Dream Documentaries for the Sociology Classroom

Dennis J. Downey, University of Utah

*California and the American Dream* is a four-part documentary series (co-produced by Paul Espinosa, Lyn Goldfarb, and Jed Riffe) addressing contemporary social issues through the lens of California. Because California occupies a central place in contemporary social and cultural changes, the stories are particularly important and interesting. Their relevance, however, is not limited to California, as they exemplify issues confronting society nationally (and globally). One of the unifying themes is the challenge of cultivating a rich common social life in a dynamic, diverse, and unequal society.

The documentaries address both individual challenges to achieving the American Dream, and the social need for redefining it in ways that are equitable and sustainable. Collectively, the series offers rich opportunities for use in the Sociology classroom, as it introduces many sociological issues and processes in engaging ways. While all segments address common themes, each 55-minute segment is independent allowing them to be presented in courses

to highlight specific issues. Below, I offer brief synopses and potential pedagogical applications for each segment. (All could be productively integrated into general courses like Introduction to Sociology and Social Problems.) For those interested in learning more about the series, a special screening of "The Price of Renewal" with producer/writer/director Paul Espinosa (series co-producer) will be held at the 2007 meetings (Friday March 30, 1:45; Session 99).

*California's 'Lost' Tribes* focuses on the emergence of gaming as a strategy for economic development among Native Americans. It traces the historical background to the current era (i.e. a century and a half of dispossession), the origins of gaming, some of the main political tensions that it entails, and some current consequences for Indian-White relations. A central theme is the effort to use economic development to regain self-determination. This segment is appropriate for courses on Race/Ethnicity, and touches on important issues in Economic and Political Sociology.

*The Price of Renewal* focuses on redevelopment of the City Heights neighborhood of San Diego – a diverse area of contemporary immigrant settlement which suffered from high crime and economic deterioration. It traces an ambitious multi-component public-private partnership for redevelopment that sought to bring community members into the process. The efforts were successful in many ways, but raise important ques-

tions regarding equity as many original residents were ultimately displaced. It is ideal for courses on Urban Sociology, as well as Race/Ethnicity, and Stratification.

*The New Los Angeles* presents a history of the emergence of Los Angeles as a "global city" – both in terms of its economic/cultural significance and demographic composition. It traces the rise of the Bradley coalition, the emergence of Latinos as city's labor base, the emergence of movements for immigrant/labor equity, the origins and consequences of the 1992 riots, statewide anti-immigrant political initiatives, and the recent election of Villaraigosa as the first Latino mayor in over a century. The segment is most appropriate for Race/Ethnicity, Urban and Political Sociology.

*Ripe for Change* begins with the growth of California agribusiness as both a powerful economic engine and a long-term threat to environmental sustainability. It addresses the reliance of our food production system on fossil fuels, pesticides, and the growth of genetically modified organisms. The segment focuses on movements seeking to bring about more sustainable and healthier production and consumption practices – such as the emergence of California cuisine, organic farming, and farmers' markets. It is most appropriate for Environmental Sociology and Social Movements courses.
