## *the 2007 Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award*

Individual Teaching Award: The Pacific Sociological Association honors outstanding career contributions to teaching, a series of projects, or a specific product or process, which an individual or small group of individuals in the western region have contributed to the teaching and learning of sociology. These may include

- Products and/or processes that enhance undergraduate and/or graduate intellectual inquiry and learning of sociology within one's own institution or beyond its campus. Examples include innovative teaching techniques, use of new technologies, service learning, distance learning, learning assessment of sociology, textbooks, publications related to teaching, teaching programs, devices or materials, laboratory designs, instructional computer packages, innovative curricular contributions or curriculum design, or workshops;
- Relevant contributions to state, regional, or national associations;
- Activities that illuminate, educate, and nurture public understanding and appreciation of the usefulness of the discipline and of sociological principles and research. The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award is given to an individual sociologist from the western region and/or to a department of sociology in the western region. The award is given to those who have developed teaching programs, curricula, or materials, which have been unusually effective in enhancing student understanding and fostering appreciation of sociology as a field of study. The grounds for nominations are open but include textbooks and other teaching materials, laboratory designs, instructional computer packages, innovative curricular contributions, and evidence of special impact on students. You must provide the Committee with three copies of the supporting documentation.

For the individual teaching award, nominations should include  
1. The name of the nominee, a very detailed statement with a very specific explanation of how this individual's work constitutes a [career] contribution to the teaching of sociology

2. Letters of support from individuals having direct knowledge of the nominee's contributions.
3. Copies of any teaching materials developed by the nominee (if relevant to the nomination).
4. Some evidence of the nominee's impact in the classroom (these might be student evaluations or other evidence).
5. The nominee's vita.
6. Additional supporting materials are encouraged.

Department Contributions To Teaching Award: The Pacific Sociological Association honors a Department of Sociology, school, or other collective actor in the western region for its outstanding contribution to the teaching of sociology. Individual strengths and competencies combine, in consensus, to produce a single product or process or a series of projects that

- Improve(s) the quality of undergraduate and/or graduate teaching and learning, e.g., sequential curriculum design; teaching programs, devices, or materials; service learning; distance learning; or learning assessment of sociology, etc.;
- Relevant contributions to state, regional, or national associations;
- Activities that illuminate, educate and nurture public understanding and appreciation of the usefulness of the discipline and of sociological principles and research.

# Hotel Information: Marriott Oakland City Center

The 2007 Annual Meeting will take place at the Marriott Oakland City Center, 1001 Broadway, Oakland, CA 94607. The hotel is conveniently located in the heart of downtown Oakland and is connected to the Oakland Convention Center. The Marriott is 21 stories tall and provides dramatic views of the city, the Bay, and San Francisco. The hotel has an Atrium Lounge, outdoor swimming pool, exercise facility, full service business center, and the City Center Grill restaurant. Every room offers high-speed internet-access, coffee maker, hair dryer, and iron and ironing board.

The hotel is within walking distance of Old Oakland, Chinatown, Preservation Park, Jack London Square, the Oakland Museum, and the City Center. There are dozens of excellent restaurants within a very short walk. On every Friday right outside the hotel, the Old Oakland Farmer's Market takes place. There is also easy access to the entire Bay Area via BART, which stops at a station just across the street from the hotel. San Francisco is a 12-minute ride and the popular restaurant and walking streets of North Oakland and Berkeley – College Avenue and the Rockridge district, Shattuck Avenue near the UC Berkeley Campus, and more – are only a 10-minute ride away. The Alameda/Oakland Ferry at Jack London Square will take you to SF Pier 41, Fisherman's Wharf, and Angel Island.

**SUPPORT THE PSA BY BOOKING AT THE MARRIOTT.** This will assure that your Association meets its sleeping room contract and will keep convention costs low, since thousands of dollars in meeting room rental will not have to be paid to the Marriott. Not meeting the PSA room block would have serious financial consequences and would most likely increase the cost of registration at future meetings.

The 2007 Convention Rate is \$135 single or double, plus tax. The standard rate is \$200 – \$225. FOR RESERVATIONS, call

ALL RESERVATIONS MUST BE MADE BY MARCH 7, 2007 to guarantee the rate. However please note that the discounted room block could easily sell out before the March 7 deadline. The hotel may still have rooms after this date, but at a rate-available basis.

HOTEL PARKING is available. Call the Marriott for the most up-to-date parking fees and information.

**AIRPORT TRANSPORTATION:** The closet airport to the Marriott is the Oakland Airport. The easiest and cheapest way to get to the hotel is to take BART. Take the Oakland Airport Bart Shuttle – \$2, exact change required – from the airport, which leaves from the baggage claim area every 20 minutes to the Coliseum BART Station. At the Coliseum Station, take the Richmond train (\$1.25) to 12th Street City Center Station in downtown Oakland. Take the 11th Street steps from the 12th Street Station and you will come out facing the Oakland Marriott City Center Hotel.

From the San Francisco Airport, you can access the BART Station at Level 3 of the International Terminal. The station has two entrances, a “walk in” entrance on Level 3 and another accessible from Air Train, the airport's shuttle train that connects various airport terminals. From the SFO station take the Pittsburg/Bay Point train (\$5.25) to 12th Street City Center Station in Oakland. Take the 11th Street steps from the 12th Street station and you will come out facing the Oakland Marriott City Center Hotel. You may also take a shuttle from the Oakland or SF Airport.

## Things to do in the Bay Area

Due to space, we can only list a few of the many interesting sights of the greater Bay Area. A BART station is located just outside the hotel, making it very easy to reach any of the venues and points of interest listed here.

**OAKLAND:** Walk to, shop and dine in Jack London Square, or take a ferry to San Francisco; visit Chinatown, a two-block walk from the hotel, and home to dozens of excellent restaurants; visit the Oakland Museum, with an enormous collection of California art, social and natural history, and ecology; dine and shop in Old Oakland and the City Center, just a few steps away from the Marriott Hotel.

**BERKELEY:** stroll the University of California campus, visit the University Art Museum and botanical gardens; and shop and dine along College, Shattuck, San Pablo, Solano and Telegraph Avenues and Fourth Street.

**SAN FRANCISCO:** view and walk the Golden Gate Bridge (or visit Fort Point, just underneath it); visit Chinatown, Union Square and North Beach; take a Cable Car ride, or a ferry to (and tour of) Alcatraz; walk up to Coit Tower or the tower at the new DeYoung Museum for a stunning view of the city; see Japantown and the Mission District, and visit the Museum of Modern Art, the Asian Art Museum, the Tattoo Art Museum, the Palace of the Legion of Honor, and the De Young museum; shop in the Castro and Haight-Ashbury districts; walk and picnic in Golden Gate Park.
