## INFORMATION ON PASADENA AND THE SHERATON HOTEL

The 2003 PSA Annual Meeting will take place at the Sheraton Hotel, 303 East Cordova Street, Pasadena, CA 91101. Pasadena is located at the base of the San Gabriel Mountains, 10 miles northeast of downtown Los Angeles.

### **The Sheraton Hotel, Old Pasadena, and the Paseo Colorado**

The Sheraton Hotel, a three star hotel, is located 10 miles from downtown Los Angeles, 14 miles from Burbank Airport, and 27 miles from Los Angeles International Airport. Each guest room is oversized (1/3 larger than comparable hotels) and has a coffee maker, hairdryer and iron/ironing board. There is also a heated outdoor swimming pool, exercise room and tennis courts. Complimentary shuttle serve to and from the hotel within a 5-mile radius is also available 7 days a week.

The hotel is centrally located in Pasadena. It is a two-block walk to Old Pasadena, an historic 20-block area, noted for its quaint alleyways and architectural styles that date back to the 1880s and 1890s. There are nearly 100 restaurants in Old Pasadena ranging from the trendy and hip to upscale bistros and outdoor cafes. And at night the area offers live entertainment from classical to blues along with billiards and dancing venues.

The Sheraton is also located next to Paseo Colorado, Pasadena's version of an open-air, urban village with three-blocks of retail shops, theaters, and eight restaurants: P.F. Chang's China Bistro, Border Grill, Island's Fine Burgers, Cafe Med, Bice, Tokyo Wako, Rubios' Baja Grill, and California Crisp.

Close-by are other Pasadena attractions: City Hall, a 1927 Italian Renaissance and Spanish styled building, the Gable House, a 1908 Greene and Greene Craftsman home open to viewing, the Norton Simon Museum, one of America's top 25 museums with works by Van Gogh, Picasso, Rembrandt, along with an extensive collection of sculpture, the Huntington Library, Art Collections, and Botanical Gardens, which cover over 150 acres, the Pacific Asia Museum, and the Pasadena Playhouse. In addition, Pasadena is only 10 miles from Hollywood and not far from other Los Angeles area attractions.

### **The PSA Convention Rate**

The PSA convention rate is \$110 for a single and \$120 for a double, plus tax. Each additional person is \$15.00 per night. PLEASE ASK FOR THE PSA RATE when making a reservation. The direct number is 626-449-4000. The toll free number is 1-800-325-3535. All reservations must be accompanied by a first night room deposit. Please note that any cancellations within (72) hours from the date of arrival will be billed for one night room and tax.

**The cut off date for all reservations at the PSA rate is February 17, 2003.** Reservation requests received after that date will be accepted on a space and rate availability basis. If the PSA rate is not available after the cutoff date, the prevailing rack rates will apply. Please keep in mind that all rooms in the PSA room block may sell out before the February 17th cutoff date.

### **Parking**

There is covered hotel parking on site. The fee is \$7.00 per car for overnight guests and \$7.00 per car per day for day guests. These rates are subject to change without prior notice.

### **Transportation to and from Los Angeles Airports**

#### **Burbank Airport**

The most convenient airport to Pasadena is Burbank Airport. It is only 14 miles (around 20 minutes) from the Sheraton Hotel. There are a variety of shuttle services from Burbank to the Sheraton: Airport Bus (1-800-772-5299); Prime Time Shuttle (1-800-733-8267); and SuperShuttle (1-800-258-3826). The fare is around \$14.00 one way. Alaska, American, America West, Continental, Delta, Southwest, and United have flights to Burbank Airport.

#### **Los Angeles International Airport**

The Sheraton Hotel is 27 miles from LAX. Travel time is around 40 minutes. The same shuttles that serve Burbank Airport (see above) also serve LAX. The fare is around \$22.00 one way. In addition, there is an Airport Bus (714-938-8937) than runs Monday-Saturday, once every two hours from the Sheraton to LAX. The fare is \$12.00 one-way.

# PSA BUSINESS MEETING, COUNCIL AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

## BUSINESS MEETING IN VANCOUVER

Dean Dorn., Secretary/Treasurer

The annual PSA business meeting took place at 6:30 PM on Saturday April 20<sup>th</sup> at the Hyatt in Vancouver. Dean Dorn gave a brief report on the “state of the PSA.” For details, see “Report from the Secretary/Treasurer” in this issue of the Newsletter. In essence, membership is stable, around 1,300 members, attendance in Vancouver was around 950, and the financial status of the PSA continues to improve. It is expected that the Endowment Fund will reach \$50,000 in January of 2003.

Dorn reported that PSA Council is considering revising the PSA Constitution for the purposes of possibly including a student on PSA Council and changing the office of Secretary/Treasurer to Executive Director or Executive Officer. Other changes may be forthcoming as well.

Dorn also reported that a new committee has been formed, the Committee on Community Colleges. The “committee” had its first meeting in Vancouver. Its purpose is to engage in outreach to faculty members in community colleges, sponsor sessions at the annual meeting, and provide opportunities for networking. Phil Gillette, Pierce College, will be the Chair of this group for the coming year.

President Jean Stockard gave a brief report on the 2003 meeting in Pasadena. The theme of the meeting is Social Science and Social Policy. The Program Committee met in Vancouver and have many interesting ideas planned, including sessions, which take advantage of issues in the greater Los Angeles area.

Earl Babbie, President-elect, gave a brief report on possible meeting themes for the 75<sup>th</sup> annual meeting, which will be held in San Francisco April 15-18, 2004.

Bob Kettlitz, Chair of the Practice Committee gave a brief report. He indicated that the committee is planning on sponsoring six or seven sessions in Pasadena, including a session on Teaching Social Policy, a roundtable for students, a session on Community Development, and a session on Clinical Sociology.

Tricia Robertson, Chair of the Membership Committee, reported that her committee would continue to sponsor the Welcome and New Members Reception in Pasadena, and it is planning on sponsoring a session on Mentoring. Dorn indicated that the Endowment Committee was also thinking of sponsoring the Welcome Reception in Pasadena and indicated that Peter Collier, the Chair of the Endowment Committee, would get in touch with Robertson about this.

Chuck Powers from Santa Clara University brought several of his students to the Business Meeting as a way of providing them with information about how a professional association is run and maintained.

The meeting closed at 7:05 PM.

## PSA 2001-2002 COUNCIL MEETING

### VANCOUVER, APRIL 19<sup>TH</sup>, 2002

The meeting started at 8:40 AM. Debora Paterniti, Chair of the Audit Committee reported that the financial records of the PSA were in meticulous order. Martin Orr, Coordinating Editor of *The Pacific Sociologist*, gave a brief report, which is published elsewhere

in this issue. In essence, Orr will stay on as coordinating editor until a new editor is appointed. Council thanked him for his work during the last six years as coordinating editor. He always seeks contributions to the Newsletter and is thinking of shrinking the paper version which is mailed out, but the full text of the Newsletter will be available online on the PSA Webs site. PSA is seeking a new editor. Peter Nardi presented a detailed report as editor of the PSA Journal, *Sociological Perspectives* (See his report in the online version of this issue of the Newsletter at [www.csus.edu/psa](http://www.csus.edu/psa)). Nardi reported that submissions are up from last year and that the acceptance rate is around 25 percent. Papers were submitted by authors from 12 different counties. The turnaround time for review is just under seven weeks. He reported that he has one year left in his term. PSA is looking for a replacement. Deadline for application for editor is November 15, 2002. A special issue is being planned for December of 2003, edited by Denise and William Bielby on Media and Popular Culture. Another special issue on the Sociology of Sport will be forthcoming. The journal received many submissions for this special issue. The journal has somewhat of a backlog, since all issues are full through March of 2003.

Dorn reported that Ken Nyberg from CSU Bakersfield asked him to report that he is creating a data base of sociological annual meeting programs from regional associations. The data base will permit comparative empirical studies of paper topics, author networks, and sociological interests—over time—across the “regions” of sociology, as well as “national” foci and participation. PSA will provide Nyberg with all of the past PSA programs.

Judith Howard reported that the 2002 meeting seems to be going well. Dorn reported that probably around 925-950 will register for the meeting, which is close to the registration last year in San Francisco. So this is quite robust considering the northern location of Vancouver and that the meeting occurred after 9/11. Howard reminded Council of her Presidential Party in her suite. It was also pointed out that there are quite a few Canadians on the program, as well as sociologists from Mexico.

Dorn reported that membership is stable at around 1,300, that registrations are stable at around 900-950, and that the financial accounts of the PSA are robust. Overall, the PSA has around \$70,000 of assets. The reason for this is the income from UC Press and the fact that the PSA is virtually an all voluntary association, with only the work study student in the PSA office and the journal editor’s assistant receiving pay. The Association does not make money on registration fees. Membership dues go toward paying for the three issues of the Newsletter and other operations. (See the Secretary/Treasurer’s Report in the online version of this issue of the Newsletter at [www.csus.edu/psa](http://www.csus.edu/psa)). Discussion followed about how to increase the number of institutional subscribers to the PSA journal in order to increase the Association’s income. Dorn reported that he would look into contacting Rebecca Simon at UC Press about this.

Dorn reported that the PSA Endowment Fund will reach \$50,000 in January of 2003. Beginning in 2004 the interest income from this Fund will be able to be used for purposes that benefit the Association. The Endowment Committee will be looking at procedures for recommending use of the funds to Council during the coming year. The Endowment Committee is planning to sponsor a fund-raiser in Pasadena. (See the report of the Endowment Committee in the online version of this issue of the Newsletter at [www.csus.edu/psa](http://www.csus.edu/psa))

Dorn asked Council for permission to function as an Executive

Director or Officer re: approving funds for special services/needs that come up at the last minute while planning the PSA annual meeting: interpreters for deaf attendees and sociologists on the annual program, requests for LCD projectors at the annual meeting, child-care, etc. Council agreed to let him decide these expenditures. It was suggested that PSA might consider purchasing a used LCD to save money on rental of this equipment. Richard Serpe indicated that Dorn could contact him about this possibility, as he has purchased such equipment from a supplier. Dorn suggested that if most people on the program will request LCDs months in advance, that every session that requires one could be scheduled on a particular day of the annual meeting, thereby reducing the need to rent the LCDs over the entire four day of the meeting. Daily rental runs about \$400-500 per day for one LCD. It was suggested that perhaps next year in Pasadena that a host institution might be able to furnish LCDs at the annual meeting. Perhaps the campuses at USC or CSU Los Angeles might be able to do so.

Dorn announced that PSA is seeking a new editor of its journal as well as the Newsletter. Dorn reported that the positions have been listed on the PSA Web site, published in the Newsletter and that the Association will place an ad in the July/August issue of ASAs Footnotes. Deadline for applications to be submitted is November 15, 2002.

Dorn also passed out an announcement regarding seeking a new Secretary/Treasurer. He indicated that this is premature in that he has at this time not decided to end his tenure. However, he wanted Council to begin to think about the position and finding a replacement. This led to a discussion about breaking up the tasks of the Secretary/Treasurer into various functions. Perhaps the President would be responsible for the program and for hotel arrangements for the annual meeting, the Vice President could be in charge of keeping all the committees of the Association running, and so forth. Dorn indicated that before he retires, he would make sure a smooth transition occurred between his tenure and whatever structure exists to take over from him. This then generated a discussion about changing the PSA Constitution to change the position of Secretary/Treasurer to Executive Director or Officer, a role Dorn has actually been playing. Such a change might make recruitment for a new person easier. Another reason for changing the Constitution is to allow an undergraduate and graduate student to serve on Council. It was agreed that the item would be placed on Sunday's Council meeting and a subcommittee possibly formed for the purpose of investigating the changes.

Council also briefly discussed offering organizational memberships, but Dorn reported that it might not be a good idea, since a single department might constitute itself as a unit and hence only want one annual membership for the entire department. Council agreed that organizational membership is probably not a good idea for the PSA.

Sharon Araj announced that Ginny Mulle had done a lot of work organizing a Poster Session for Undergraduates at the meeting in Vancouver. This was sponsored by AKD and Araj indicated that AKD was going to present Mulle with an award in Session 103 in Vancouver.

The final item on the agenda was proposal by the Library of Social Science Books to organize the publisher's display at the annual meeting. Dorn reported that the LSS was first present at the annual meeting last year in S.F. The LSS contacts publishers and takes care of displaying their books should they wish to pay a fee for the service. This year the LSS was able to display around 180 books from various publishers. The LSS also pays the PSA for the cost of

display tables that it uses, so that the PSA neither makes or loses money from this operation. Dorn indicated that the LSS makes a contribution to the annual meeting and that he would like to see them display books. Their effort makes an excellent "Combined" exhibit. However, he and other Council members are concerned that some of the publishers who almost always display books—Wadsworth, Sage, Allyn & Bacon, etc—might not attend if they had to go through LSS, as the cost to them would be much higher or that they would decide not to rent tables and send reps, but would instead decide to display only a few books at the annual meeting through LSS. After discussion, Council asked Dorn to inquire further about the arrangements and to see if publishers that normally display at the PSA annual meeting might be able to continue to make arrangements through the PSA office rather than LSS and that LSS could then be responsible for all other publisher's books. Dorn will report on this to Council in the future. It was suggested by Council that Dorn talk to publishers about this and see what they say. Would Sage decide to go through LSS at greater cost than PSA? Dorn will investigate this and get back to Council in the future.

The Meeting was adjourned at 9:40 AM.

## **2002-2003 COUNCIL MEETING**

### **VANCOUVER APRIL 21<sup>ST</sup>, 2002.**

Members Present: Stockard, Dorn, Howard, Babbie, Serpe, Hohm, Hood, Miller-Loessi, Martinelli, O'Brien, Kulis, and Fernandez: guest Phil Gillette

Jean Stockard reported that the 2003 Program Committee had met in Vancouver. There were lots of interesting proposal discussed for sessions, and she felt very good about the meeting and the planning for next year. Several Sessions are being planned that deal with the Los Angeles Area. Babbie reported that the 2004 meeting will be held in San Francisco. He is playing around for ideas for themes. He would like to pick up on the themes from 2002, Social Justice and 2003 Social Science and Social Policy, so he is thinking about the themes of "Sociology, Making a Difference" and "Sociology, an Idea Whose Time Has Come." Babbie is chauvinistic about sociology and wants that attitude to be capture in the theme of the 2004 meeting.

Chuck Hohm reported that few registrants attended the meetings in Vancouver that were organized by sociologists and social scientists from Mexico. At one of them, no one was in attendance and at another he was the only member of the audience. We need to do something about this, as we want as an Association to be inclusive, but on the other hand, we don't want sessions which are not attended by anyone. After discussion, it was decided that Chuck Hohm contact Rodolfo Cruz, one of the session organizers, and explain to him that we will attempt to rectify this situation in the future, that we thank those from Mexico for attending and that we want to have them attend and participate in the future. We also discussed the possibility of scheduling these sessions at better hours, trying to highlight them in the program, having council members take responsibility for attending, and contacting students (AKD) and others about the sessions. Serpe suggested that at the first Council meeting in Pasadena, that Council should discuss having members of the Council attend these sessions, if there are any in Pasadena. Serpe suggested contacting organizations in the LA area (such as the US Center for Border Studies and the Center for Border Studies at CSU San Marcos) that deal with border and immigration issues and perhaps have them announce the sessions in their Newsletters. It is too embarrassing to have the same situation next year in Pasadena. Jane Hood suggested that attendees attend sessions because they know the presenters. In this case, few attendees knew the presenters

from Mexico. Babbie suggested that the sessions may sound like they are only about Mexico and if attendees aren't interested, they won't show up. He also suggested that sessions on immigration policy or poverty or border issue might be fore popular even though they would have presenters from Mexico.

Dorn indicated that there is a dilemma that professional associations have. In order to get people to the meeting, many of them have to be on the program. Thus the PSA has to run 12-13 sessions per meeting hour. And there is the distraction of the city in which the meeting is being held. Hence all of this dilutes the number of attendees who are in the hotel at any given time to attend the various sessions. Some members stay only one day and other two or three days as well. If we cut back on the number of presenters and sessions, then there will be fewer in attendance and then we may have difficulty meeting our contractual obligations to the hotel. Thus there is always a balancing act between the number of sessions and presenters (being inclusive) and the number of potential attendees at any given time for any given session. Another issue was raised that perhaps there are a few members who are organizing too many sessions. Dorn indicated that Council in the past has discussed this and decided that until there was a clear need for a policy limiting the number of times a presenters can be on the program, that the best policy is no policy. One way to be inclusive and control the number of sessions is to have more roundtables.

Phi Gillette from Pierce College in LA gave a brief report on the effort to reach out to faculty members in the Western Region who teach at community colleges. He suggested at last year's Business Meeting that a possible meeting be organized in Vancouver. He followed through and reported that about 13 faculty from community colleges attended the meeting yesterday. There was some discussion as to whether a community college or group should exist in the PSA. By doing so, it may lead to balkanization and separation. But it was decided that the group should continue for at least another year. Two action items came out of the meeting. First, a committee of correspondence will be set up and second, an effort will be made to try to contact community college faculty to let them know about the PSA, the annual meeting, etc. The group also will sponsor three sessions in Pasadena—a session on the Introductory Course, a session on Non Traditional Approaches to Teaching Sociology, and a Workshop on Teaching in the Community College, ending with a reception where attendees could network with one another. The group is also trying to establish a list serve for community college faculty as well.

Dorn reported that the Publication's Committee will be placing an ad in Footnotes for a new editor for Sociological Perspectives. The deadline will be November 15, 2002. In case there were not enough applications by then, they could revisit the issue. The decision on the new editor won't be made until Council meeting next year in Pasadena. All the applications will be sent to the PSA office and then Dorn will forward them to the Publication's Committee members. The Publication's Committee will forward names to Council for its decision.

The editor must be from the Western Region and coeditors will also be accepted.

The PSA is also looking for a new editor for the newsletter. Martin Orr from Boise State will continue to edit the newsletter until someone comes forth and applies.

Dorn reported that the Endowment Committee will have to come up with procedures for using the interest income from the Endowment Fund, which will reach \$50,000 next January. When the fund reaches this amount, interest income can be used for projects

that are consistent with the mission of the PSA. Endowment Committee is thinking about using the money for student travel grants if the student is a presenter at the annual meeting. A procedure for doing so would be to have all such students send their name to the PSA office for a raffle drawing for x number of grants. This procedure would eliminate paper work and the difficult task of making judgments about who is more deserving. Next year the Endowment Committee will be cosponsoring the welcome reception with the Membership Committee. Jean Stockard's son will provide jazz music. During the Welcome Reception, donations will be asked for the Fund and all who donate will be eligible for a raffle for gift certificates for Pasadena restaurants. Funds will not be used until 2004. The Endowment Committee is also going to ask Council next year to become a continuing committee with the function of fund raising and recommending use of the fund's interest income to Council.

Council also suggested that funds, perhaps Endowment Funds, could be used to provide travel stipends for the undergraduate and graduate award winners.

Council approved the delegation of authority to the Chairs of the Nominations Committee (Judith Howard) and the Committee on Committees (Richard Serpe) to come up with candidates on the fall ballot and to fill appointments to various PSA Committees.

Council appointed a subcommittee to work on updating the PSA Constitution to possibly provide for a student member of Council and to change the title of the Secretary/Treasurer to Executive Director, which is really how Dorn functions. The Subcommittee members will be Earl Babbie, Jean Stockard, and Richard Serpe. The subcommittee will gather information and explore possible changes and report back to Council in Pasadena.

The Council adjourned at 9:40 AM.

#### **Report from the Audit Committee**

Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award, Jonathan Turner, UC Riverside

Distinguished Scholarship Award, Pierette Hondagneu-Stotelo, USC, for her book, *Domestica*.

Undergraduate Paper Award, Molly George, formerly an undergraduate at the University of Denver University, now headed to UC Santa Barbara in the graduate sociology program, for her paper, *Performance vs. Appearance: Body Negotiations of Collegiate Women Athletes*.

Graduate Paper Award, Amy Denissen, UCLA, for her paper, *Perpetual Pioneers: Women's Efforts to Gain Inclusion in the Construction Trades*.

Charles Verano, CSU Sacramento, is the new chair of the PSA Awards Committee. The committee requests that the PSA change its policy of giving checks to the winners of the graduate and undergraduate competitions, and instead pay for two nights in the

convention hotel. We recommend this change in an effort to make it easier for student award winners to attend the conference and receive their awards in person.

### **Report from the Committee on Civil Rights and Civil Liberties**

The Committee on Civil Rights and Civil Liberties met at the Vancouver 2002 meetings and selected a new chair, Dennis Loo from Cal Poly Pomona. The committee agreed that the suppression of dissent in the aftermath of September 11 warranted very urgent attention from the association. We also heard about the efforts by the Humboldt State University Administration to dismantle the Native American Studies Program there. We are proposing a plenary session and two paper sessions on issues related to the preceding.

To wit: we are proposing a plenary entitled "Silencing: Attacks on Academic Freedom and Civil Liberties," and two paper sessions entitled, respectively, "Civil Liberties and the Demise of Civil Society in the Wake of September 11," and "Suppression of Civil Liberties: the U.S. Patriot Act and Homeland 'Security.'"

We are currently discussing who might be invited to participate in the plenary (e.g., the ACLU), and invite the association membership to make suggestions.

### **Report from the Committee on Committees**

Dean Dorn passed out information regarding the committees that will need appointments for the next appointment cycle. Those appointed will begin their terms at the annual meeting in Pasadena in 2003. There are few openings for this cycle. There will be one opening on the Committee on Teaching, three openings on the GLBT committee, two on the Committee on Practice, Applied, and Clinical Sociology, and two on the Social Conscience Committee. There may be other appointments that will need to be made as members resign or drop out of the PSA as a result of moving to a new region or not paying membership dues.

### **Report from the Community College Ad Hoc Committee**

Last year Phil Gillette from Pierce College suggested at the PSA Business Meeting that the PSA consider trying to "reach out" to sociologists in community colleges. Council approved this idea and Gillette constituted a one-person committee. At the Vancouver meeting, an organizational session was scheduled in the PSA Program for 8:30 AM on Saturday April 20<sup>th</sup>. Thirteen sociologists from community colleges in the western region attended.

At the organizational meeting, there was some discussion as to whether a community college-group should exist in the PSA. By doing so, it could lead to balkanization and separation. But it was decided that the group should continue for at least another year. Two action items came out of the meeting. First, a committee of correspondence will be set up, and second, an effort will be made to try to contact community college faculty to let them know about the PSA, the annual meeting, etc. The group also will sponsor three sessions in Pasadena—a session on the Introductory Course, a session on Non Traditional Approaches to Teaching Sociology, and

a Workshop on Teaching in the Community Colleges, ending with a reception where attendees could network with one another. The group will also try to establish a list serve for community college faculty as well. Phil Gillette will continue as the coordinator.

### **Report from the Endowment Committee**

Dean S. Dorn, Secretary/Treasurer

The Endowment Committee met in Vancouver on April 19, 2002. Members present: Peter Collier, Richard Serpe, Roberta Lessor, Joe Ribal, Dennis Downey, and Jean Stockard.

Dean Dorn reported that the Endowment Fund as of 3/25/02 has a balance of \$37,833.63. Contributions during the last year have come from the general membership, the transfer of \$7,500 of unused OE money from the PSA general account, and \$7,500 transferred to the fund in lieu of payment to Dean Dorn for his work as Secretary/Treasurer.

When the Fund was established, interest income could start to be used only after the Fund reached \$50,000. Dorn indicated that the Fund would reach \$50,000 by January 2003. Hence, one of the items on the Committee agenda was to begin to discuss the procedures for soliciting ideas for use of the interest income in 2004 and what would be appropriate for the use of the funds. The original purposes of the Fund could include PSA operating expenses, maintenance and improvement of its publications, one-time special projects, scholarships and grants to students, visiting scholars to the PSA annual meeting, monetary gifts to the annual award winners, dissertation research grants, minority scholarships, and any other activities approved by the PSA Council which enhance the Association, its membership, and the profession in the western region.

Two agenda items were then discussed. First, fund raising for next year. After some discussion, the Committee decided to have a jazz trio (thanks to Jean Stockard's son) at the welcoming dessert reception on Thursday night April 3<sup>rd</sup> in Pasadena. A suggested donation will be asked for at the door. All those who donate, will receive a raffle ticket for gift certificates at Pasadena restaurants.

The second agenda item dealt with procedures and ideas for use of the Fund's interest income, starting in 2004. After lengthy discussion the Committee tentatively decided on using the money for Student Travel Grants. The procedure would involve informing all students who are listed on the Preliminary Program for the annual meeting in 2004 in San Francisco that they are eligible for a raffle for a student grant. If they wished to enter the raffle, they would send their name and email address to the PSA office. Once a final list of names was secured, names would be drawn randomly for the awards. Winners would be notified and mailed a check, which they could use to help pay travel expenses to the meeting.

The Committee will finalize the details during its annual meeting in Pasadena next year and forward its decisions to PSA Council for its approval. PSA Council makes the final decision on expenditures from the Endowment Fund.

Peter Collier agreed to Chair the Committee during 002-2003.

### **Report from the Committee on Freedom of Research and Teaching (COFRAT) Jennifer Eickstedt, Chair**

The COFRAT Committee has continued its work during the 2001-2002 year. We have been working with one member of the PSA who has concerns over freedom of teaching issues, and we held valuable sessions at the 2002 PSA annual meetings in Vancouver, BC. COFRAT sponsored sessions for the 2002 meetings included: *Teaching Sexualities and Other Controversial Topics: Administrative,*

*Legislative and Student Responses*, Organized by COFRAT Chair, Jennifer Eichstedt. The session, held on Thursday at 4:45 was well attended (24 people), and the group engaged in lively discussion. Interestingly, the topics discussed by the presenters all related to the presentation of sexuality by students and teaching of sexuality(ies) and responses from students, administrators and, in one case, state legislators. Susan Murray organized a panel on *Ratcheting up Teaching and Research Requirements at Educational Institutions*, which was also well attended and allowed participants and audience to explore how expectations for faculty have changed and have led to a very different climate and experience for junior faculty. Ms. Murray also facilitated the presentation of a workshop on *Human Subjects: Federal Guidelines vs Local Campus Practices*.

Joyce Miller Iutcovich, from Keystone University Research Center and representing the ASA, came to present the workshop to PSA members; unfortunately, this workshop was not well attended (only 3 people attended). We are unsure of how to interpret this lack of attendance and would appreciate feedback from the membership (please address feedback to Professor Susan Murray at [sumurray@email.sjsu.edu](mailto:sumurray@email.sjsu.edu)). Ms. Iutcovich Presented important information regarding the importance of complying with the Human Subjects review committees that exist on campuses and the materials that she provided were distributed to COFRAT members at the Committee meeting on Saturday.

The Committee met on the Saturday of the meetings and there was a relatively full contingent present. Members present included: Jennifer Eichstedt, Chair; Cherylynn Bassani, University of Calgary; Shelley Eriksen, CSU Long Beach; Tim Delaney, Canisius College; Susan B. Murray, San Jose State; Toska Olson, Evergreen State College; and Martin Orr, Boise State University. The Committee discussed the role of the Committee and came up with a number of exciting sessions for the 2003 meetings. The proposed sessions include the following topics: Challenges to Authority faced by Faculty of Color (including the impact on Retention, Tenure and Promotion); the silencing of Sociological analysis post 9/11; Part-Time Faculty: Exploitation?; Threats to Scholarship and Scholars: International and National Cases; and the Politics of Grading and Classroom Evaluation. COFRAT also anticipates co-sponsoring sessions with other Committees.

As always, the Committee would like to encourage members to PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS TO FREEDOM IN TEACHING AND RESEARCH. We are always seeking information on problems sociologists may be having in protecting their rights to academic freedom of inquiry and expression. To do that job the committee needs your input. What sorts of difficulties are you, as PSA members, having in these areas? In the present times of scarce funding for research the power of granting agencies to dictate methods of inquiry as well as topics of study increases, as does that of university research oversight committees, human subjects panels and the like. There may also be pressures on some institutions and departments to adjust their curricula to accommodate the needs of particular corporate interests. Individual scholars who do not conform to these trends may find themselves at a disadvantage when their teaching and scholarship are evaluated for promotion and tenure. If you are aware of similar instances, or of related problems of concern to COFRAT, the committee wants to hear from you. Send us a description of the problem outlining the parties involved, the subject of dispute, the direct effects on teaching or research and the efforts made to resolve the issue. All responses will be treated as confidential. Please indicate if you are requesting official consideration by the committee. Send material to the incoming Chair.

Peter Nardi provided the committee with his annual report on the journal, *Sociological Perspectives*. He noted a December 2003 special issue on "Media, Popular Culture, and the Arts" guest-edited by Denise D. Bielby and William T. Bielby. Peter has extended his editorship into a fourth year at which time a new editor will take over.

Most of the April meeting focused on a new editor for *Sociological Perspectives*. An advertisement for the editorship is already on the PSA web site. An advertisement also appeared in the April 2002 PSA program. We discussed different formats for doing so (reception, panel session, dinners, etc.) and agreed to organize something for the Pasadena meeting. In addition to this session, we generated a list of potential sessions that our committee could sponsor for next year's meetings in Pasadena, keeping in mind the theme of next year's meetings is Social Science and Social Policy. Members were encouraged to rethink title sessions since, according to the program committee, narrowly titled/focused paper sessions limit the number of papers one is likely to receive.

Discussion at this meeting centered on generating fresh ideas about how to attain a more proactive and visible presence within the PSA. As chair of the committee I was personally interested in exploring how this committee could better fulfill its institutional description of monitoring the participation of women in the discipline. This discussion generated the following four ideas:

1. Instigating the development of systematic data collection on

matters related to women in the PSA. This would serve two functions: a) to simply monitor the status of women and gendered analysis within the discipline, b) to provide opportunities for people (esp. students) who are looking for opportunities to do empirical research, especially within a mentoring environment. Specific topics could include:

- list of presidents by sex
- list of other leadership positions by sex (including program committee members)
- ratio of membership by sex vs. attendance of conferences
- themes of meetings, sessions
- content analysis of presidential addresses
- relationship btwn. institutional size and prestige and a number of other factors, including sex, positions of leadership w/in the PSA, rank within existing institution
- geographical variation
- issues related to department chair selection and training. Two data bases are currently in existence and/or developing: one organized by the ASA, the other by the CSU system.

2. Instigating a more formal relationship between The Status of Women committee and SWS.

This could happen through a variety of means, including:

- possible sharing of data base (and other) resources
- an invitation to all SWS members attending the next PSA to attend a social gathering. (unknown as to how this would be funded – perhaps jointly through PSA and SWS?)

3. Increased visibility and recruitment, especially of students interested in participating in data collection and analysis of PSA data described above. This is an area that needs more development. Ideas include:

- clear and accessible web site link with information and opportunities associated with the committee
- letter (email) to all soc. depts.. in PSA jurisdiction (need to find out if PSA has such a list)
- also, we didn't discuss this in the meeting but perhaps next year we can come prepared with fliers to pass out to interested students and/or arrange an info. table.

4. sessions proposed for PSA 2003 – Social Science and Social Policy

1. Women and welfare (Marie Butler)
2. Political Assault on the Family (Kathleen Kaiser)\*
3. Girls and Deviance (Joanne Higgenson)

### **Report from the Student Affairs Committee**

We held our annual meeting at the PSA in Vancouver, which was attended by Dean Dorn, Michele Adams, Kari Lerum, Deanna Rohlinger, Akihiki Hirose and myself. I was elected chair through 2003. During this meeting, we discussed the student reception planned for later that evening and planned for next year's meeting. In the coming year, our committee is planning to organize several

panels on topics of particular interest to student members and to assist with the graduate student reception at the 2003 PSA in Pasadena. In addition, our committee is planning to explore ways of working with other committees, such as the Committee on the Status of Women.

### **Report from the Committee on Teaching**

The Committee on Teaching met in Vancouver, British Columbia, on Saturday morning, April 20th, 2002; six people were present, three members were absent. Topics of discussion included the Teaching Awards, keeping a high profile for teaching within the PSA, and sessions for next year's meeting in Pasadena, California.

With regard to the Teaching Awards, we discussed how the awards are defined as contributions to teaching. This is a broad conception which suggests that the recipients may good teachers but also may have produced intellectual or other goods that have been received as a valuable contribution to teaching.. We also discussed maintaining a high profile for teaching within the PSA. We decided that a survey should be performed to gain feedback from the members on teaching related issues.

As we did in years previous, we spent the majority of the meeting brainstorming sessions for next year's meeting. We identified over sixteen session proposals. Topics include those relating to Social Science and Social Policy (the theme of next year's meeting), service learning, sensitive issues in the classroom,. We also discussed the possibility of co-sponsoring sessions with other committees relevant to the topic, i.e., COFRAT, Civil Liberties.

We ended the meeting on time by voting to have Sally Raskoff continue as chair and agreeing to continue our discussion throughout the year.

### **Report from the Editor of *Sociological Perspectives***

Editorial Office: Pitzer College continues to be very generous in providing some shared office space, staff time, and work-study students, in particular Margarita Levantovskaya. Heather Gillespie continues as the Managing Editor and assists in the preparation of the manuscripts for publication and working directly with the publisher and printer. We continue to have our abstracts translated into Spanish, Chinese, and Japanese, with the able assistance of several expert translators: Zoila E. Vergara de Gudgell, Cheng-hsien Lin, Chiung-fang Chang, Hiroko Inoue, and Yoko Katsuyama.

The Publishers: Our relationship with University of California Press remains very positive. The Press has this past year implemented on-line access to the journal. Mary Guitar at the Press has helped immensely with production, but has announced that she is leaving the Press shortly. We hope to have a smooth transition with her successor. Sheila Berg continues as a very effective copy-editor, and Marge Dean has been organizing the paperwork needed to process Authors' Agreement forms and procedures.

Special Issues: Shari Dworkin and Michael Messner organized a special issue on "gender and sports" that will be published in December. It's amazing how popular the topic is: we received 26 articles, and the editors have accepted 6, possibly 7 (pending revisions), articles. Acceptance rate for the special issue was around 25%. Almost 75% of the authors of submitted papers were female, and nearly 60% used qualitative methods.

In addition, we have just announced in *Footnotes* and related publications, another special issue, this one on "Media, Popular Culture, and the Arts" to be guest edited by William Bielby and

Denise Bielby of the University of California, Santa Barbara. Deadlines for submission are this fall with a scheduled publication for December 2003.

Regular Issues: We continue to solicit reviews using email and this procedure works exceptionally well. Although it can take as many as a dozen emails to find three or four reviewers, most of the time, we are able to obtain commitments fairly efficiently. By getting an agreement to review before we send the paper, we have been able to receive reviews in just under seven weeks on average.

Between April 1, 2001 and March 31, 2002, we received 80 new papers (this excludes resubmitted papers from previous "revise and resubmits" and articles for the special issue on gender and sports).

## CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR PSA AWARDS FOR 2003

If you wish to submit a nomination for an award, you must supply the supporting materials and documentation detailed below for each award. While it is possible for a person, publication, etc., to be nominated in more than one year, if appropriate, no nominations or supporting materials will be carried over from year to year. It is the nominator's responsibility to submit three copies of all nominations and supporting materials including articles, books, etc. by the nomination deadline. **The deadline will be February 1, 2003 for all awards except in the case of the Distinguished Scholarship Award. The nomination deadline for that award will be December 1, 2002.**

### The 2003 Distinguished Scholarship Award

The Pacific Sociological Association's Award for Distinguished Scholarship is granted to sociologists from the Pacific region in recognition of major intellectual contributions embodied in a recently published book or series of at least three articles on a common theme. To be eligible for the 2003 award, a book must have been published in 2001 or later. If a nomination is based on a series of articles, the most recent article in that series must have been published in 2001 or later. The Committee does NOT accept nominations for the Scholarship Award from Publishers. Nominators must be from individual members of the PSA. If a book has both a hardback and paperback copyright date and no significant changes have been made in the book between editions, the committee will consider the earlier copyright date as the one determining eligibility for the award. Nominations for distinguished scholarship and all supporting materials must be submitted by December 1, 2002. You must provide the Committee with three copies of the book and/or articles.

### The 2003 Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award

Individual Teaching Award: The Pacific Sociological Association honors outstanding career contributions to teaching, a series of projects, or a specific product or process which an individual or small group of individuals in the western region have contributed to the teaching and learning of sociology. These may include:

- Products and/or processes that enhance undergraduate and/or graduate intellectual inquiry and learning of sociology within one's own institution or beyond its campus. Examples include innovative teaching techniques, use of new technologies, service learning, distance learning, learning assessment of sociology, textbooks, publications related to teaching, teaching programs, devices or materials, laboratory designs, instructional computer packages, innovative curricular contributions or curriculum design, or workshops;
- Relevant contributions to state, regional, or national

associations;

- Activities that illuminate, educate, and nurture public understanding and appreciation of the usefulness of the discipline and of sociological principles and research. The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award is given to an individual sociologist from the western region and/or to a department of sociology in the western region. The award is given to those who have developed teaching programs, curricula, or materials which have been unusually effective in enhancing student understanding and fostering appreciation of sociology as a field of study. The grounds for nominations are open but include textbooks and other teaching materials, laboratory designs, instructional computer packages, innovative curricular contributions, and evidence of special impact on students. You must provide the Committee with three copies of the supporting documentation.

For the individual teaching award, nominations should include

1. The name of the nominee, a very detailed statement with a very specific explanation of how this individual's work constitutes a [career] contribution to the teaching of sociology
2. Letters of support from individuals having direct knowledge of the nominee's contributions.
3. Copies of any teaching materials developed by the nominee (if relevant to the nomination).
4. Some evidence of the nominee's impact in the classroom (these might be student evaluations or other evidence).
5. The nominee's vita.
6. Additional supporting materials are encouraged.

Department Contributions To Teaching Award: The Pacific Sociological Association honors a Department of Sociology, school, or other collective actor in the western region for its outstanding contribution to the teaching of sociology. Individual strengths and competencies combine, in consensus, to produce a single product or process or a series of projects that

- Improve(s) the quality of undergraduate and/or graduate teaching and learning, e.g., sequential curriculum design; teaching programs, devices, or materials; service learning; distance learning; or learning assessment of sociology, etc.;
- Relevant contributions to state, regional, or national associations;
- Activities that illuminate, educate and nurture public understanding and appreciation of the usefulness of the discipline and of sociological principles and research.

For the departmental teaching award, nominations should include evidence that supports the departmental nominee in

the above categories. You must provide three copies of the evidence.

### **The 2003 Distinguished Practice Award**

The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Practice Award honors sociological work in the Pacific region (whether by an academic or non-academic) which has an impact on government, business, health, or other settings not directly connected with academia. The grounds for nomination include (but are not limited to) any applied sociological activity that improves organizational performance, contributes to community betterment, and/or eases human suffering. You must provide the Committee with three copies of the supporting documentation:

1. A nominating letter which provides an overview of the nominee's distinguished practice contributions;
2. Letters of support from individuals having direct knowledge of the nominee's distinguished contribution to sociological practice.
3. Copies of presentations at scholarly conferences, published articles, and/or grant/contract proposals, primarily authored by the nominee, which address issues in sociological practice. This award is given bi-annually.

### **The 2003 Distinguished Undergraduate Student Paper Award and \$200 honorarium**

The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Student Paper Award recognizes an undergraduate student for a paper of high professional quality. **This award includes a \$200 honorarium and two nights of lodging at the 2003 convention hotel.** To be eligible a paper must be (a) worthy of special recognition for outstanding scholarship; and (b) written by an undergraduate student or students in the Pacific region. The paper must be unpublished. You must provide the Committee with three copies of the paper, including an abstract, accompanied by at least one letter of support.

### **The 2003 Distinguished Graduate Student Paper Award and \$200 honorarium**

The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Student Paper Award recognizes a graduate student for a paper of high professional quality. **This award includes a \$200 honorarium and two nights of lodging at the 2003 convention hotel.** To be eligible a paper must be (a) worthy of special recognition for outstanding scholarship; (b) in a format appropriate for submission to a major journal with a likelihood of acceptance; and (c) written by a graduate student or students attending a University in the Pacific region. At least one letter of support and three copies of the paper, including an abstract, should accompany nominations.

### **The 2003 Distinguished Contribution to Sociological Perspectives Award**
