APRIL 16-19, SAN FRANCISCO, CA**

Theme: The Value of Sociology

The era in which we live is often portrayed as being characterized by blurred genres, shifting boundaries, organizational change, and identity anxieties and transformations at both the level of individuals and collectivities. Whether this widespread instability and uncertainty represents a short-term perturbation, much like a passing storm, or is constitutive of a sea change that warrants such descriptors as "post-modern," is open to empirical assessment and interpretive debate. Yet, there is no question but that we live in a period of change and existential skepticism in which the very institutions we are moored to are themselves subject to self-examination and change, as evidenced by widespread experimentation with new management strategies such as TQM (total quality management) and CORE (continuous organizational renewal) and the institution of new corporate adaptive strategies such as "downsizing" and "outsourcing."

The institutional contexts in which most sociologists work – be they community colleges, small liberal arts colleges, state colleges, or large universities – are hardly immune to such changes and experimentation. Indeed, seemingly incessant budget cuts, assaults on affirmative action and the institution of tenure, and the redefinition of the role of regents and trustees in relation to the colleges and universities they oversee, suggest that the academy itself is searching for a new operational template and perhaps even a new reason for being.

Within this context, the very disciplines and programs that traditionally have been constitutive of a college or university education often find themselves having to justify their existence by answering such questions as the following: What is the utility of what you do and for whom? What is the value-added character of your enterprise for the students you teach, for the local community, and for the world beyond?

Such questions are no less relevant to sociology than to any other discipline or program. Indeed some would argue they are especially pertinent to sociology, contending that our enterprise is on trial as in no time before. I would agree in part, because the challenge today is multifaceted, coming from within as well as outside the discipline. Sociology has often had its critics, but generally the harshest criticism has issued from within the discipline, as exemplified by Maurice Stein and Arthur Vidich's 1963 edited volume titled *Sociology on Trial*. Today, however, the trial is rooted in more than intradisciplinary friction and the jury is much broader than fellow sociologists.

Thus, it is clearly in our interest to give serious thought to the value of what we do as sociologists. Accordingly, I invite you to join with me and other members of the association to think seriously and collectively about the substance of what we do as sociologists. What is the value-added character of what we do for our students, for the communities in which our institutions are embedded, for the larger world, and for the development of a more thoroughgoing understanding of human behavior, social institutions, and social change? What difference does the practice of sociology make?

Nominate yourself or suggest colleagues to organize sessions on various topics and issues of interest to you, but with an emphasis on how sociological instruction and research contribute to an understanding of those topics and issues.

PRELIMINARY PROGRAM: SAN DIEGO, APRIL 17-20

Important Notice to All Participants Who Are Listed in the Preliminary Program and to All Those Who Will be Attending the San Diego Meeting: Payment of Registration Fees and Membership Dues

Several points about meeting preregistration, program participation, and membership are discussed below. These items need your attention.

1. Preregistration and Membership Dues: All program participants must preregister for the Annual Meeting before April 1, 1997 in order to have their names listed in the final program. A form is included in this newsletter (see page 3). If you have not already paid preregistration fees, please return the form with your payment. If you were a member in 1996, you should already have received a dues renewal and preregistration form for the Annual Meeting.

There are four clarifications to the preregistration fee and membership dues requirements for those who are listed on the program in San Diego:

1. In cases of multiple-authored papers, co-authors who are NOT attending the meeting do not have to pay preregistration fees or membership dues. However, the person responsible for presenting the paper in April, must preregister and must also pay membership

THE PSA ANNUAL MEETING SAN DIEGO APRIL 17-20, 1997: HOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS

The 1997 PSA Annual Meeting will take place at the HOLIDAY INN ON THE BAY at the Embarcadero, 1355 North Harbor Drive, San Diego, CA 92101. See the map on the back cover for the specific location.

SHUTTLE SERVICE FROM AIRPORT AND PARKING AT THE HOTEL

For complementary shuttle service to the hotel from the airport, locate the Hotel Phone Board at the baggage claim area, push the button for the Holiday Inn on the Bay. Hotel parking for registered guests is currently \$10 per 24 hour period with in and out privileges. Other persons attending the conference but not staying overnight at the Holiday Inn must pay the regular rate for parking as posted. Parking rates are subject to change.

ROOM RESERVATIONS

The hotel rate is \$95 single or double. Guaranteed bay view rooms will be an additional \$20. Reservations can be made by calling 1-800-4BAYSIDE or directly to the hotel at 619-232-3861. You must mention you are attending the PSA conference.

WHY VISIT SAN DIEGO?

Why Visit San Diego? If you haven't been to San Diego recently, you may be asking yourself this question. Of course the best answer is, "Because the Pacific Sociological Association is holding its annual meeting there." Yet another, acceptable answer is, "San Diego is a dynamic, throbbing city with much to offer in the way of entertainment."

San Diego's traditional image is that of a smallish, conservative, mostly white, Navy town. Things have changed on all counts. While San Diego, like most of southern California, is more conservative than northern California, politics are more complex and interesting than they were in the past. After all, San Diego went for Bill Clinton. Also, like the rest of southern California, San Diego has become extremely diverse from an ethnic point of view. This city has sizable proportions of Hispanic, African-American, Middle Eastern, and Asian populations. The Filipino and Southeast Asian populations are particularly well represented. While the Navy is still an important "player" in town, it is much less central to the city's economy than in the past. Biomedical research and manufacturing concerns, as well as information systems concerns, are starting to become more important to the city's economy. Finally, San Diego is no longer a small town. The 1990 U.S. census shows San Diego to be the sixth largest city in the country.

What to do in this fair City? I would answer this question with a question. How much time to do you have? I would suggest coming a day or two before the PSA meetings or staying a bit longer. The Holiday Inn at the Embarcadero has a fantastic location – right on the waterfront overlooking San Diego Bay and within walking distance of many attractions in the city.

Across the street from the hotel is the Star of India, the last iron hulled sailing ship to be built in the world. The "Star" is part of San Diego's Maritime Museum (along with the "Berkeley" which is moored at her side) and is well worth boarding. Further down the street, one can utilize the services of a number of San Diego Bay tour companies which offer boat excursions that cover the total bay – under the Coronado Bridge to the South Bay and all the way to Point Loma and the Pacific Ocean.

If one keeps walking south along the waterfront, you will run into Seaport Village, a beautiful development with numerous shops and restaurants. Watch the street performers do their thing or sip a cup of cappuccino while watching the boats sailing in the bay or do the thing that sociologists love to do most – watch the people.

Another interesting area of the city is the Gaslamp Quarter – a refurbished area of downtown San Diego named after the attractive gaslamps that line the streets. This area of town is the place to be at night with its many fine restaurants and clubs.

Of course, the most famous and well known tourist attraction in San Diego is its world-class zoo. This amazing collection of flora and fauna continues to improve and expand. Even if you have been to the San Diego Zoo within the last few years, you will notice considerable change if you visit it in April. The Zoo is located in Balboa Park which has a multitude of museums to see. One of the most interesting is the Ruben H. Fleet Space Museum which captures much of San Diego's contribution to aviation.

Sea World is another attraction that is located on Mission Bay. This park has been expanded and offers a multitude of aquatic shows.

Finally, San Diego is next to Mexico. A day trip to Tijuana or Ensenada is always rewarding.

dues. In other words, at least one co-author must preregister and pay membership dues or the entire paper and all co-authors will be dropped from the program.

2. If you are a sociologist from the western region, you must pay both 1997 membership dues and 1997 preregistration fees.

3. If you are a sociologist but NOT from the western region, you MUST pay preregistration fees, but you do not have to pay 1997 membership dues.

4. If you are NOT a sociologist, you must pay 1997 preregistration fees, but you do NOT have to pay membership dues.

2. Program Participation

Being on the program means being listed in any position – presider, moderator, panelist, critic, roundtable presenter, roundtable presider/discussant, seminar leader/presenter, discussant, session organizer, presenter, workshop leader, speaker, etc. In short, any place your name appears is counted as a participation.

3. Attendance at the Meeting

If you are attending the meeting but are not on the program, you are expected to pay either preregistration fees or registration fees at the door. Preregistration fees are \$25 for faculty and/or over \$15,000 income per year and \$17.50 for students and/or under \$15,000 income per year. Registration fees at the door will be \$35 for faculty and/or over \$15,000 income per year and \$25 for students and/or under \$15,000 annual income.

Repeat your recommendation on a regular basis.

Make a point to regularly request articles appearing in *Sociological Perspectives* via interlibrary loan. Some libraries monitor interlibrary loan traffic to determine which journals are so frequently requested that it is more cost effective to subscribe to them.

Include articles from *Sociological Perspectives* on the required reading lists for your courses and ask that they be put on reserve at the library. Materials required for courses often play a role in librarians' decisions about whether to subscribe to a journal.

EDWIN M. LEMERT (1912-1996)

Edwin Lemert had just completed his last book, *The Trouble With Evil*, (and was beginning to work on a new article) at the time of his death on November 10, 1996. Lemert earned what will undoubtedly be an enduring place in the discipline with his pioneering work in the labelling theory of deviance (which he preferred to define as social reaction theory). After teaching for a decade at UCLA, he became, in 1953, the founding chair of the Sociology Department at UC Davis, where he continued to work daily long after formal retirement. He served as President of the PSA and of the Society for the Study of Social Problems, and served as a member or consultant to numerous agencies – including Presidential Commissions on juvenile justice, violence, and alcoholism.

Ed is missed by his six children and by his many grandchildren, nephews, and nieces, some of whom were just beginning to realize what his many friends in the intellectual professions had long known: this was a modest, hardworking, and brilliant man, who thought against the grain, and lived an extraordinarily full and productive life.

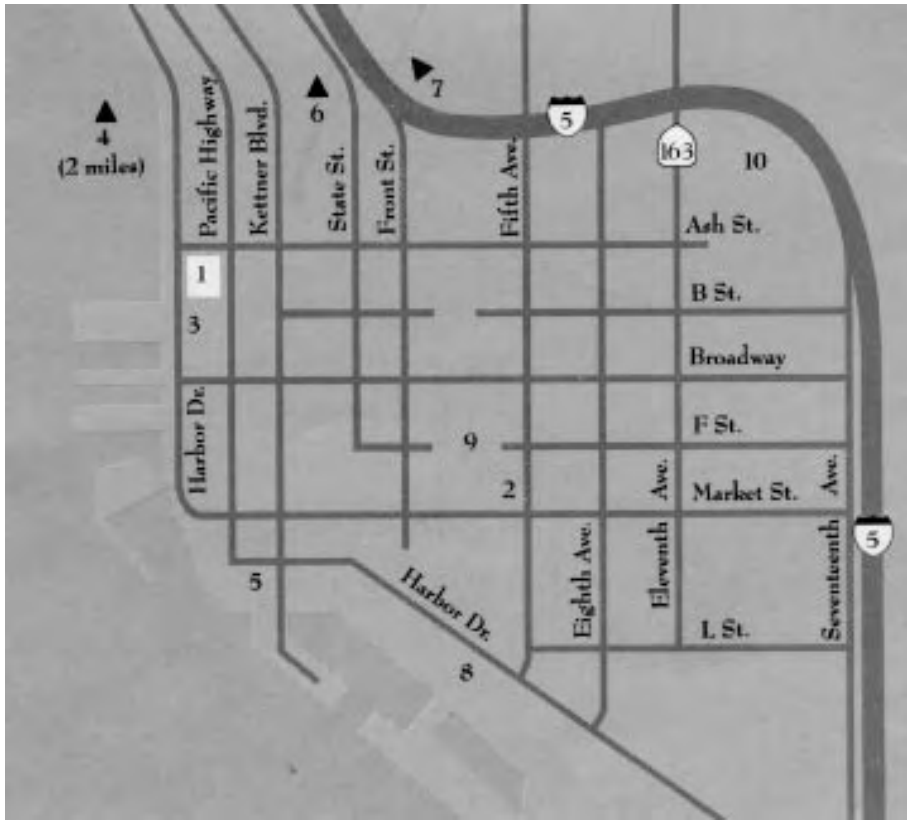
