## IMPORTANT NOTICE – REGISTRATION AND MEMBERSHIP DUES FOR THOSE LISTED IN THE PRELIMINARY PROGRAM

### Payment of Registration Fees and Membership Dues

Several points about meeting preregistration, program participation, and membership are discussed below. These items need your attention.

#### 1. Preregistration and Membership Dues

**All program participants must preregister for the Annual Meeting before April 1, 1999 in order to have their names listed in the final program.** A form is included in this newsletter. If you have not already paid preregistration fees, please return the form with your payment. If you were a member in 1997 or 1998, you should already have received a renewal for 1999 dues and a preregistration form for the Annual Meeting.

There are four clarifications to the preregistration fee and membership dues requirements for those who are listed on the program in Portland:

In cases of multiple-authored papers, co-authors who are NOT attending the meeting do not have to pay preregistration fees or membership dues. However, the person responsible for presenting the paper in April, must preregister and must also pay membership dues. In other words, at least one co-author must preregister and pay membership dues or the entire paper and all co-authors will be dropped from the program.

If you are a sociologist from the western region, you must pay both 1999 membership dues and 1999 preregistration fees.

If you are a sociologist but NOT from the western region, you MUST pay preregistration fees, but you do not have to pay 1999 membership dues.

If you are NOT a sociologist, you must pay 1999 preregistration fees, but you do NOT have to pay 1999 membership dues.

#### 2. Program Participation

Being on the program means being listed in any position – presider, moderator, panelist, critic, roundtable presenter, roundtable presider/discussant, seminar leader/presenter, discussant, session organizer, presenter, workshop leader, speaker, etc. In short, any place your name appears is counted as a participation.

#### 3. Attendance at the Meeting

If you are attending the meeting but are not on the program, you are expected to pay either preregistration fees or registration fees at the door. Preregistration fees are \$25 for faculty and/or over \$15,000 income per year and \$17.50 for students and/or under \$15,000 income per year. Registration fees at the door will be \$35 for faculty and/or over \$15,000 income per year and \$25 for students and/or under \$15,000 annual income.

## **HOTEL INFORMATION FOR THE 1999 PSA ANNUAL MEETING, PORTLAND, OREGON, APRIL 15-18**

Hotel Accommodations: The 1999 PSA Annual Meeting will take place at the **Marriott Hotel 1401 S. W. Front Street, Portland, OR 97201**. The hotel is located in the heart of downtown Portland, on the west bank of the Willamette River. The downtown cultural district, including the Portland Art Museum, Performing Arts Center, Historical Society are within easy walking distance from the Hotel. Pioneer Square and Shopping Place are seven short blocks away. You can board the Max Light Rail six blocks away or take a walk along the beautiful McCall Waterfront Park. The Portland airport is 15-20 minutes away.

The PSA 1999 Convention Rate is \$105 single and \$125 double, plus tax. To make a reservation call **1-800-228-9290** or the hotel directly at **503-226-7600**. Please ask for the PSA convention rate. **ALL RESERVATIONS MUST BE MADE BY MARCH 25, 1999 to guarantee the PSA rate.**

## **SUGGESTIONS FOR PARTICIPANTS\***

If you were a discussant, how would you like to get the papers for review the night before the session? As an audience member, how do you like it when presenters read their papers word for word while droning on and on through fifty years of literature review? I make the following suggestions to new and experienced presenters.

1. Get your completed paper to the discussant at least a month before the meetings. A good review can be tremendously helpful for revising the paper for publication. But it takes time and thought. Every year, however, some discussants do not get papers until they arrive at the meetings. The discussants are doing you a favor. Help them to help you by giving them the time they need.
2. After you have finished the formal written version of your paper, edit it for a presentation version,. Remember, you will normally have only 12-15 minutes to give your paper if there are four other presenters. Discuss only what is important. For a traditional research paper, for example, focus on the findings. Introduce the topic succinctly, summarize the literature briefly, mention the methods in passing and spend most of your time discussing the findings and their implications.
3. Do not read your paper to the audience. Talk about it. The well-crafted written formal sentence may be a better visual than audio experience. Remember, you audience is listening, not reading.
4. Arrive at your session ten minutes early. The presider will brief you on organization, order, and time limits.
5. Adhere to time limits. Four to five paper presentations, discussant comments, and audience participation do not allow much flexibility in one session. Presiders may enforce appropriate social sanctions on presenters who monopolize time.
6. If you bring copies of your paper for distribution, you may reduce the weight by printing single space on both sides of each page. Many presenters must bring copies of the statistical tables or model figures, perhaps with a abstract.

### 2000 PSA MEETING, MARCH 23-26 IN SAN DIEGO

Theme: Expanding Sociological Horizons in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century

As the millennium approaches, it is time to look back over the past century and to look forward to a new era, a time for review and renewal. What sense should we make of the past one hundred years of sociological praxis? What can we expect to know and to change in times ahead? What should we take forward into the 21<sup>st</sup> century as sound wisdom and valued praxis? What should we leave behind? How might we envision varied forms of society and social life in the next century?

The passing of a century illuminates an oft-neglected dimension of social existence – time. From the grand sweep of history to epiphanies of transformed self-awareness, rhythms and meanings of time underlie social life and sociological analysis. How do our methods of knowing frame what we can know? Which and whose purposes does our work serve? What should be our goals and our praxis? Our tools for observing the world may differ. Our places and points of inquiry spread across the range of human experience. And our priorities may vary. However, we come together on the enduring significance of studying the nature and consequences of social bonds, inequalities, social action and individual agency, collective and individual meanings.

We bring these and other concerns to our review of this century and our hopes for the next. The 21<sup>st</sup> century poses new possibilities for sociological insights to inform social transformations. Still, problems of the past shade the promise of the future. The social contract in the US as we have known it has eroded during the 1990s. Persistent suffering and continued social problems result from inequalities and growing divisions within and between societies. An emergent global social and economic structure gains hegemony as money, power, and technology reach across the world and recast the environment. Education itself has steadily assumed a corporate form replete with downsizing, cutbacks, speed-ups, and technical fixes.

During the past decade, PSA has evinced renewed vitality and gained significance in western North America and around the Pacific Rim. Our organizational time and space horizons have expanded. As PSA increasingly becomes an international society, its horizons expand beyond regional and national to global arenas. Now we need to look ahead to shaping our discipline and setting its agenda for the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Contribute to the vitality of PSA and of our discipline. Plan to attend the 2000 PSA meeting in sunny Southern California.

We have a series of instructional subsets [see "Exercises"] each of which includes a downloadable data set in the form of a SPSS portable file and a codebook, plus exercises. You can use these on an LED overhead projector or from an instructor's station in a computer lab for a classroom presentation or demonstration. Or, you can provide links to them from your on-line syllabus for regular assignments or as independent and extra credit projects, with little or no modification. Last, exercises and datasets can be downloaded in wordprocessing format which you can then modify, distribute via floppy disk, or place on a local server.

These exercises provide practice in univariate and multivariate analysis, from basic frequencies and recodes to multiple regression and cross-tabs with control variables.

Six of the data sets were expanded into longer, substantive teaching materials [see "Modules"]. Each of the teaching

modules we have created contains a theoretical perspective and background on an important social science topic, a discussion of methods used to research the topic, and a set of exercises (with a data set) to teach analytic techniques for arriving at scientifically valid conclusions about the topic using SPSS or other statistical packages.
