## PRELIMINARY PROGRAM: THE 71<sup>ST</sup> ANNUAL PACIFIC SOCIOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION MEETING SAN DIEGO, CALIFORNIA, MARCH 23-26, 2000

THEME: EXPANDING SOCIOLOGICAL HORIZONS IN THE 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY

Dear PSA Colleagues:

On behalf of the PSA 2000 Program Committee and President Cathy Charmaz, I want to cordially invite everyone to the meeting in San Diego. I believe we have succeeded in constructing one of the most outstanding programs ever assembled. It includes a number of excellent Presidential Sessions and related events, over 175 paper and panel sessions, a dozen or more roundtables, and several workshops. It is fitting that such a fine program would come together the way it has to launch the PSA into the 21st Century and next Millennium.

President Cathy Charmaz has enticed five, first-rate scholars to organize the following highly provocative and historically relevant Presidential Sessions: 1) Gary Fine, Northwestern University, on "Horizons of Sociological Theory"; 2) Judith Howard, University of Washington, on "Diversity in the 21st Century"; 3) Richard Mitchell, Oregon State University, on "The Future of Government in a Global Society"; 4) Debora Paterniti, Baylor College of Medicine, on "The Future of Health and Care in Aging Societies"; and 5) Charles Hohm, San Diego State University, on "Transforming Asia/Asian American Studies: Pacific Rim Research in the 21st Century." To top off this extraordinarily powerful Presidential program, President Charmaz has also succeeded in bringing the prestigious Sorokin Lecture to the meetings this year. As many of you are no doubt aware, this lecture is sponsored by the American Sociological Association and honors the best that American Sociology has to offer. This year's lecture features Randall Collins presenting ideas derived from his magisterial treatise on *The Sociology of Philosophies: A Global Theory of Intellectual Change*. Should be dynamite; plan to be there! One additional program note. Last year Bill Domhoff, UC Santa Cruz, was awarded the PSA's "Outstanding Scholarship Award." In response the Program Committee has organized a special "Author Meets Critics" panel to celebrate and critically evaluate the sociological significance of Domhoff's scholarly contribution to the discipline, particularly his classic work, *Who Rules America? Power and Politics in the Year 2000*. Should be very stimulating discussion, especially in the wake of The Battle of Seattle!

I want to conclude by acknowledging some individuals who helped construct this exciting Preliminary Program. It would not be the high-quality program it has turned out to be without the active support and wisdom of Dean Dorn, Secretary Treasurer and guiding spirit of the PSA. I would also like to personally thank Virginia Mulle, University of Alaska Southeast, and Hal Charnofsky, CSU - Dominguez Hills, for doing such a wonderful job organizing all of the great student sessions.

## IMPORTANT NOTICE—REGISTRATION AND MEMBERSHIP DUES FOR THOSE LISTED IN THE PRELIMINARY PROGRAM

**Payment of Registration Fees and Membership Dues:** Several points about meeting preregistration, program participation, and membership are discussed below. These items need your attention.

**1. Preregistration and Membership Dues:** All program participants must preregister for the Annual Meeting before March 10, 2000 in order to have their names listed in the final program. A form is included in this newsletter. If you have not already paid preregistration fees, please return the form with your payment. If you were a member in 1998 or 1999, you should already have received a renewal for 2000 dues and a preregistration form for the Annual Meeting.

There are four clarifications to the preregistration fee and membership dues requirements for those who are listed on the program in San Diego:

- In cases of multiple-authored papers, co-authors who are NOT attending the meeting do not have to pay preregistration fees or membership dues. However, the person responsible for presenting the paper in March, must preregister and must also pay membership dues. In other words, at least one co-author must preregister and pay membership dues or the entire paper and all co-authors will be dropped from the program.
- If you are a sociologist from the western region, you must pay both 2000 membership dues and 2000 preregistration fees.
- If you are a sociologist but NOT from the western region, you MUST pay preregistration fees, but you do not have to pay 2000 membership dues.
- If you are NOT a sociologist, you must pay 2000 preregistration fees, but you do NOT have to pay 2000 membership dues.

**2. Program Participation:** Being on the program means being listed in any position—presider, moderator, panelist, critic, roundtable presenter, roundtable presider/discussant, seminar leader/presenter, discussant, session organizer, presenter, workshop leader, speaker, etc. In short, any place your name appears is counted as a participation.

**3. Attendance at the Meeting:** If you are attending the meeting but are not on the program, you are expected to pay either preregistration fees or registration fees at the door. Preregistration fees are \$25 for faculty and/or over \$15,000 income per year and \$17.50 for students and/or under \$15,000 income per year. Registration fees at the door will be \$35 for faculty and/or over \$15,000 income per year and \$25 for students and/or under \$15,000 annual income.

### **San Diego for Sociologists Gordon Clanton, San Diego State University**

For sociologists attending the annual meeting of the Pacific Sociological Association, March 23-26, 2000, San Diego has a lot to offer, especially for those who can come for an extra day or two. San Diego, population 1.1 million, is the sixth largest city in the United States. The population of San Diego County is almost 3 million.

San Diego has great weather in March, mild enough to go to the beach, but too cool to go into the ocean – unless you are very hardy or wear a wetsuit. For visitors with cars, three great places for savoring the Pacific are **Mission Beach**, with its boardwalk, funky shops, and skater culture (I-8 West to West Mission Bay Drive exit to the intersection with Mission Blvd. – about 5 miles from the DoubleTree Hotel); **Point Loma**, a 400 foot headland with spectacular views of the ocean, the bay, and the city (I-8 West to Rosecrans exit and follow state Route 209 to the end – about 9 miles from the hotel); and **Torrey Pines State Beach**, where you can walk between the ocean and towering carved sandstone cliffs worthy of Arizona or Utah (I-8 West to I-5 North to the Carmel Valley Road exit, then left and left again at North Torrey Pines Road and park by the ocean – about 15 miles from the hotel).

San Diego has history. The first European visitor was Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, a Portugese explorer in the service of Spain, who arrived in San Diego just 50 years after Columbus first came to the New World. San Diego is the oldest city in California, having begun as a Spanish Catholic mission established by Father Junipero Serra in 1769. You can visit the **San Diego Mission**, about 3 miles east of the hotel. The **Old Town State Historical Park**, about 3 miles west of the hotel, includes the ruins of the original Presidio and numerous Victorian structures. The square-rigged **Star of India**, anchored off Harbor Drive at the foot of Ash Street about 3 miles from the hotel, is the oldest merchant vessel afloat. Built in 1863, the Star has circumnavigated the globe more than 20 times.

San Diego is a border town on the Pacific Rim. The U.S./Mexico border is about 14 miles south of the hotel [and see **Day Trip To Mexico**, page 17]. You can see the Pacific Ocean, the border fence, and a Mexican bull ring from the **Border Field State Park** in the southwestern-most corner of the United States (I-8 West to I-5 South to the Dairy Mart Road exit and follow signs). From the southern terminus of the Trolley (see below) at the international border, it is but a short taxi ride to the main shopping and dining district of Tijuana. San Diego is surprisingly diverse, with thriving communities of Italians, Portugese, Iraqis, Filipinos, Vietnamese, Cambodians, Laotians, Hmong, Nigerians, Somalis, Sudanese, Ethiopians, Eritreans, Russians, and Croatians.

San Diego has animals. The world famous **San Diego Zoo** is in Balboa Park, about 3 miles south of the hotel. The Zoological Society also operates the zoo of the future, the **San Diego Wild Animal Park**, just east of Escondido on state Route 78, about 18 miles north of the hotel. Visitors ride an electric train around huge enclosures in which hundreds of African and Asian animals run free. The **Sea World** amusement park is about 5 miles west of the hotel, accessible from westbound I-8 via the Mission Bay Drive exit. In addition to the Zoo, **Balboa Park**, built in 1915 to celebrate the opening of the Panama Canal in 1916, includes the **Museum of Man**, the **Museum of Art**, the **Museum of Natural History**, and the **Aerospace Museum**. Balboa Park info: 239-0512.

San Diego has food and fun. The Old Town State Historical Park has several good Mexican restaurants. You usually have to stand in line at **Casa de Pico** (296-3267) – but it is worth it. **Casa de Bandini** (297-8211) is housed in a Victorian building with a beautiful courtyard. My colleague Chuck Hohm is preparing a guide to San Diego restaurants.

San Diego has a **Trolley** with a stop at the DoubleTree Hotel. The east-bound trains stop at Mission Valley Shopping Center (with its 20-screen cinema and **Seau's** Restaurant) and **Qualcomm Stadium**. The west-bound trains stop at the Fashion Valley Shopping Center and Old Town and then turn south to Downtown San Diego, the **Horton Plaza** Shopping Center (with its award-winning architecture), the **Gaslamp Quarter** (shops, restaurants, and nightlife), and the international border. DoubleTree Hotel personnel will be able to help you find your way via public transportation to most of the attractions listed here. For Trolley, train, and bus information, phone 800/COMMUTE. **Hotel Accommodations and Reservations: DoubleTree Hotel, Mission Valley, San Diego, CA**

The 2000 PSA Annual Meeting will take place at the DoubleTree Hotel at the Hazard Center in the Mission Valley District of San Diego, just off Hwy. 163 and I-80. Each room has a mini-bar, iron and ironing board, coffee maker, and PC dataport. The hotel has both an indoor and outdoor pool, health and fitness center, tennis courts, restaurant, jogging trail, and spa. The DoubleTree is 10 minutes from the San Diego Airport. It has been slightly edited for the PSA. We continue to reprint this piece because it offers excellent advice for everyone on the program.]*

If you were a discussant, how would you like to get the papers for review the night before the session? As an audience member, how do you like it when presenters read their papers word for word while droning on and on through fifty years of literature review?

I make the following suggestions to new and experienced presenters.

1. Get your completed paper to the discussant at least a month before the meetings. A good review can be tremendously helpful for revising the paper for publication. But it takes time and thought. Every year, however, some discussants do not get papers until they arrive at the meetings. The discussants are doing you a favor. Help them to help you by giving them the time they need.

2. After you have finished the formal written version of your paper, edit it for a presentation version. Remember, you will normally have only 12-15 minutes to give your paper if there are four other presenters. Discuss only what is important. For a traditional research paper, for example, focus on the findings. Introduce the topic succinctly, summarize the literature briefly, mention the methods in passing and spend most of your time discussing the findings and their implications.

3. Do not read your paper to the audience. Talk about it. The well-crafted written formal sentence may be a better visual than audio experience. Remember, your audience is listening, not reading.

4. Arrive at your session ten minutes early. The presider will brief you on organization, order, and time limits.

5. Adhere to time limits. Four to five paper presentations, discussant comments, and audience participation do not allow much flexibility in one session. Presiders may enforce appropriate social sanctions on presenters who monopolize time.

6. If you bring copies of your paper for distribution, you may reduce the weight by printing single space on both sides of each page. Many presenters must bring copies of the statistical tables or model figures, perhaps with an abstract.

## CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR PSA AWARDS FOR 2000

If you wish to submit a nomination for an award, you must supply the supporting materials and documentation detailed below for each award. While it is possible for a person, publication, etc., to be nominated in more than one year, if appropriate, no nominations or supporting materials will be carried over from year to year. It is the nominator's responsibility to submit three copies of all nominations and supporting materials including articles, books, etc. by the nomination deadline. **The deadline will be February 1, 2000 for all awards except in the case of the Distinguished Scholarship Award. The nomination deadline for that award will be November 1, 1999.**

### **The 2000 Distinguished Scholarship Award**

The Pacific Sociological Association's Award for Distinguished Scholarship is granted to sociologists from the Pacific region in recognition of major intellectual contributions embodied in a recently published book or series of at least three articles on a common theme. To be eligible for the 2000 award, a book must have been published in 1998 or later. If a nomination is based on a series of articles, the most recent article in that series must have been published in 1998 or later. The Committee does NOT accept nominations for the Scholarship Award from Publishers. Nominators must be from individual members of the PSA. If a book has both a hardback and paperback copyright date and no significant changes have been made in the book between editions, the committee will consider the earlier copyright date as the one determining eligibility for the award. **Nominations for distinguished scholarship and all supporting materials must be submitted by November 1, 1999. You must provide the Committee with three copies of the book and/or articles.**

### **The 2000 Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award**

**Individual Teaching Award:** The Pacific Sociological Association honors outstanding career contributions to teaching, a series of projects, or a specific product or process which an individual or small group of individuals in the western region have contributed to the teaching and learning of sociology. These may include:

- Products and/or processes that enhance undergraduate and/or graduate intellectual inquiry and learning of sociology within one's own institution or beyond its campus. Examples include innovative teaching techniques, use of new technologies, service learning, distance learning, learning assessment of sociology, textbooks, publications related to teaching,

teaching programs, devices or materials, laboratory designs, instructional computer packages, innovative curricular contributions or curriculum design, or workshops;

- Relevant contributions to state, regional, or national associations;
- Activities that illuminate, educate, and nurture public understanding and appreciation of the usefulness of the discipline and of sociological principles and research.

The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award is given to an individual sociologist from the western region and/or to a department of sociology in the western region. The award is given to those who have developed teaching programs, curricula, or materials which have been unusually effective in enhancing student understanding and fostering appreciation of sociology as a field of study. The grounds for nominations are open but include textbooks and other teaching materials, laboratory designs, instructional computer packages, innovative curricular contributions, and evidence of special impact on students. **You must provide the Committee with three copies of the supporting documentation.**

For the individual teaching award, nominations should include:

1. The name of the nominee, a very detailed statement with a very specific explanation of how this individual's work constitutes a [career] contribution to the teaching of sociology
2. Letters of support from individuals having direct knowledge of the nominee's contributions.
3. Copies of any teaching materials developed by the nominee (if relevant to the nomination).
4. Some evidence of the nominee's impact in the classroom (these might be student evaluations or other evidence).
5. The nominee's vita.
6. Additional supporting materials are encouraged.

**Department Contributions To Teaching Award:** The Pacific Sociological Association honors a Department of Sociology, school, or other collective actor in the western region for its outstanding contribution to the teaching of sociology. Individual strengths and competencies combine, in consensus, to produce a single product or process or a series of projects that:

- Improve(s) the quality of undergraduate and/or graduate teaching and learning, e.g., sequential curriculum design; teaching programs, devices, or materials; service learning; distance learning; or

learning assessment of sociology, etc.;

- Relevant contributions to state, regional, or national associations;
- Activities that illuminate, educate and nurture public understanding and appreciation of the usefulness of the discipline and of sociological principles and research.

For the departmental teaching award, nominations should include evidence that supports the departmental nominee in the above categories. You must provide three copies of the evidence.

#### **The 2000 Distinguished Practice Award**

The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Practice Award honors sociological work in the Pacific region (whether by an academic or non-academic) which has an impact on government, business, health, or other settings not directly connected with academia. The grounds for nomination include (but are not limited to) any applied sociological activity that improves organizational performance, contributes to community betterment, and/or eases human suffering. **You must provide the Committee with three copies of the supporting documentation:**

1. A nominating letter which provides an overview of the nominee's distinguished practice contributions;
2. Letters of support from individuals having direct knowledge of the nominee's distinguished contribution to sociological practice.
3. Copies of presentations at scholarly conferences, published articles, and/or grant/contract proposals, primarily authored by the nominee, which address issues in sociological practice.

#### **The 2000 Distinguished Undergraduate Student Paper Award**

The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Student Paper Award recognizes an undergraduate student for a paper of high professional quality. To be eligible a paper must be (a) worthy of special recognition for outstanding scholarship; and (b) written by an undergraduate student or students in the Pacific region. The paper must be unpublished. **You must provide the Committee with three copies of the paper accompanied by at least one letter of support.**

#### **The 2000 Distinguished Graduate Student Paper Award**

The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Student Paper Award recognizes a graduate student for a paper of high professional quality. To be eligible a paper must be (a) worthy of special recognition for outstanding scholarship; (b) in a format appropriate for submission to a major journal with a likelihood of acceptance; and (c) written by a graduate student or

students attending a University in the Pacific region. **At least one letter of support and three copies of the paper should accompany nominations.**

#### **The 2000 Distinguished Contribution to Sociological Perspectives Award**

The Pacific Sociological Association's Distinguished Contribution to *Sociological Perspectives* Award honors an outstanding article published in *Sociological Perspectives* during a two-year period. To be eligible, the article must be worthy of special recognition for outstanding scholarship and contribution to the discipline. The article must have been published in Vol. 41 (1998) or Vol. 42 (1999). This award is given bi-annually. You must provide the Committee with three copies of the nominated article.

### **TRANSFORMATIONS: SOCIAL ACTIVISM AND SOCIAL CHANGE**

Since the inception of sociology, professional sociologists, sociological practitioners, and social activists have combined theory, research, and practice in their efforts to improve society. Sociologists inside and outside of higher education have attempted to document, understand, and teach about the causes and consequences of prejudice, inequality, and oppression. They have questioned the reasons for the social patterns they observe, envisioning more just societies and developing strategies to promote them through various governmental, private, and collective actions. In this sense, sociology has served as a social conscience within and beyond the academy, challenging inequality, championing the rights and dignity of those with limited access to the dominant means of cultural and intellectual production, and working to create more just social relations throughout the world.

The 2001 PSA Program theme focuses on sociology's historical and emergent role as an agent of social change. How and why has social activism contributed to our discipline, and what role might it play in the future? What does sociology offer for our understanding of individual and organizational attempts to bring about social change? What sorts of personal, political, economic, and cultural transformations might we expect from participation in social movements? What role should academic sociologists play in promoting social change and how should we channel our

efforts on behalf of various social causes? Finally, what prospects do such efforts hold for achieving systemic change, how might we expect our experiences to affect us as men and women, and how might changes in our professional and civic roles facilitate transformations in our personal lives?

The PSA Program Committee seeks to generate presentations and discussions of theoretical and empirical research on all aspects of social activism and social change with special emphasis on the intersections of self, identity, and social forces. Research on social movements for democracy, racial equality, gender equity, political freedom, worker control, gay/lesbian rights, environmental protection, and world peace are encouraged, as well as on movements concerned with limiting government, reinstating moral authority, promoting religious fundamentalism, preserving neighborhoods, ending welfare, fighting crime, defining heterosexual marriage, censoring television, or any of a host of other contemporary public issues. We are interested in understanding a wide range of processes related to social movements and social change conceived in the broadest terms. What conditions lead to group formation or personal identification, how do various cultural and political themes develop as foci for social action, and what are the intentional and unintentional consequences of social movements and social activism? In an increasingly diverse society with sustained levels of inequality, focusing on social change can help us to better understand the role of social activism within and beyond sociology.

We invite sociological researchers, educators, and practitioners from all perspectives to join in our analysis of transformations in the analysis of the self and the social, the personal and the professional, at the 72nd annual meeting of the Pacific Sociological Association. The 2001 PSA meeting in San Francisco promises an exciting and vibrant exchange of ideas in a variety of interactive formats: roundtables, debates, panel discussions, paper presentations and workshops. ### Distance Learning or Work for Hire

I submit to you a very useful statement from the American Association of University Professors (AAUP)—specifically from Mark Smith of AAUP, drawing on AAUP's large document on distance learning and copyright protection—concerning the potentially problematical term "works made for hire." This term, when not defined along the lines stated here, can potentially make all professors' lectures "works made for hire" and thereby owned by the university, not the professor. This is especially an issue when courses taught by distance learning could be sold to a wider audience and leave the professor without rights over his or her own courses. The definition below goes a long way toward helping with this problem, and should be used in contract negotiations, as well as in legislation.

"In accordance with prevailing academic practices the definition of 'works made for hire' does not include such 'traditional academic works' as class notes and syllabi, books and articles, works of fiction and nonfiction, poems and dramatic works, musical and choreographic works, pictorial, graphic, and sculptural works, and educational software, commonly known as 'courseware.' It is the policy of San Diego State University to treat the faculty member as the copyright owner of such works when they are created independently and at the faculty member's own initiative for traditional academic purposes. This policy shall apply regardless of the physical medium in which these 'traditional academic works' appear, that is, whether on paper or in audiovisual or electronic form."
